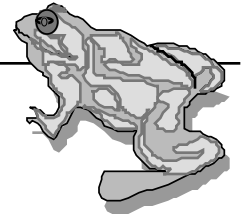


IDENTIFYING FROG & TOAD SOUNDS



GROUND LEVEL, NEAR WATER

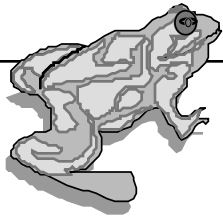
<u>sound</u>	<u>frog/toad</u>	<u>where most commonly found</u>
loud, low pig-like grunt.....	Pig Frog.....	calls in water or on submerged plants
ALARM CALL: single high-pitched squeak		
finger rubbing across balloon, long sound, low.....	Leopard Frog.....	by water's edge or fallen logs near water
<i>similar:</i> Cuban Treefrog which is a little higher & shorter		
ALARM CALL: single high-pitched squeak (then splash)		

ON PLANT STEMS, IN TREES & SHRUBS (some can be on ground for short periods of time)

<u>sound</u>	<u>frog</u>	<u>where most commonly found</u>
<i>whank-whank</i> up close, cowbell-like from distance.....	Green Treefrog.....	on stems, stalks, branches, boardwalk
RAIN: single, high-pitched bark.....Green Treefrog..... on stems, stalks, branches, boardwalk		
rasping snore, sound descends at end.....	Cuban Treefrog.....	on stems, buildings, branches
<i>similar:</i> Leopard Frog, which is a little lower & longer		
nasal trill like angry squirrel, short, sound rises at end.....	Squirrel Treefrog.....	on stems, stalks, leaves, branches
RAIN: like an angry squirrel fussing at something.....Squirrel Treefrog.....on stems, stalks, leaves, branches		
like typing, morse code, or castanets.....	Pinewoods Treefrog.....	high in tree tops, comes down to breed
single bell-like note, like a seal barking.....	Barking Treefrog.....	(rare around this far south)
RAIN: loud barking sound..... Barking Treefrog.....(rare around this far south)		

GROUND LEVEL, DRIER AREAS (some near swales and standing water)

<u>sound</u>	<u>frog</u>	<u>where most commonly found</u>
sheep-like, <i>baah-baah</i>	Narrow-mouthed Toad....	around or under logs (eats ants & termites)
soft, musical cricket-like chirp or trill.....	Greenhouse Frog.....	under logs, debris
finger rubbing teeth of small comb, high raspy trill.....	Florida Chorus Frog.....	under logs, debris
low rasping snore, or woodpecker drumming.....	Gopher Frog.....	hides in burrows in day, heard night only
like a tinkle of glass, so high-pitched almost inaudible.....	Little Grass Frog.....	clings to grass blades
like toy metal cricket-noise makers, marbles clacking.....	Florida Cricket Frog.....	clings to grass blades
chick-like, <i>peep -- peep</i> (straight, flat tone).....	Oak Toad.....	grass, fallen twigs and leaves
high musical trill; loud (trilling tone).....	Southern Toad.....	grass, fallen twigs and leaves, night caller
like immature crow complaining, <i>kahh - kahh</i>	E. Spade Foot Toad.....	grass, fallen twigs, near sandy areas

Note: Water conditions may alter these times. The majority of frogs and toads call most often during breeding season, which requires water. If drought conditions occur during the regular breeding season, they may put it off for a while and will call when the water returns, even if it's not at the "scheduled time."
